**Public Hearing Ordinance 916:**

Mr. Garrett Lytle, Miller Court, Bayview Estates; Supports the recommendation of the water and sewer commission made to maintain the 5% increase of water and sewer rates for the upcoming budget, supports deferral of Capitol projects and COLAS.

Mr. Joe K; Tydings Road: Supports the 5% increase in the water and sewer rates. Feels that the Capitol Cost account balance may look good at the moment but has to last for a twenty year period of time.; Feels the need to protect Capitol Account funds.

Motion carries 6-0 on roll call vote.

After the resolution was assigned a number and the header read into the record, Council President Craig made a motion and Councilmember Guldenzopf seconded the motion to adopt Resolution 2010-07. Motion carries 6-0 on roll call vote.

**ORDINANCE NO. 912 AN ORDINANCE DELETING AND REPLACING CITY CODE CHAPTER 169 STORM WATER MANAGEMENT IN ITS ENTIRETY IN ORDER TO BRING THE EXISTING CODE INTO COMPLIANCE WITH THE MARYLAND ANNOTATED CODE ENVIRONMENT ARTICLE**

A motion was made by Councilmember Guldenzopf and seconded by Council President Craig to introduce Ordinance 912 on second reading. Motion carries 6-0. A motion was made by Council President Craig to adopt Ordinance 912 and was seconded by Councilmember Miller. Councilmember Guldenzopf made a motion to adopt the changes to Ordinance 912 as discussed at the Public Hearing. Councilmember Cullum asked for the changes to be read into the record. Mr. Mills stated the syntax changes were made by Joe Kochenderfer at the Public Hearing and they consisted of renumbering, typo's and grammatical changes. The second change is to remove the authority to issue waivers and variances from the inspection services to the Director of Planning or his/her designee. Councilmember Cullum seconded the motion. Upon a roll call of 4 in favor and Council President Craig and Councilmember Shank opposing the motion to amend the Ordinance was approved 4-2. Upon a roll call vote of 5 in favor and Councilmember Shank opposed, Ordinance 912, as amended, was adopted on second reading, 5-1.

**ORDINANCE NO 913 AN ORDINANCE BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF HAVRE DE GRACE ADOPTED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF ARTICLE XI-E OF THE MARYLAND CONSTITUTION, ARTICLE 23A AND 66B OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND, AND SECTIONS 33 AND 34 OF THE HAVRE DE GRACE CITY CHARTER, FOR THE PURPOSE OF AMENDING HAVRE DE GRACE CITY CODE CHAPTER 205 ZONING ARTICLE II SECTION 205-13 DEFINITIONS**

A motion was made by Councilmember Guldenzopf and seconded by Council President Craig to introduce Ordinance 913 for second reading. Motion carries 6-0. A motion was made by Councilmember Shank and seconded by Councilmember Martin to adopt Ordinance 913. Under the question, Councilmember Miller made a motion to amend Ordinance 913, Councilmember Martin seconded the motion. The amendments are as follows.

**Section A Paragraph 3 Community Residential Facility:**

ANY DWELLING LICENSED, CERTIFIED, OR AUTHORIZED BY STATE, FEDERAL, OR LOCAL AUTHORITIES AS A RESIDENCE FOR **EXAMPLE BUT NOT LIMITED TO** CHILDREN OR ADULTS WITH PHYSICAL, DEVELOPMENTAL OR MENTAL DISABILITIES, DEPENDENT CHILDREN OR ELDERLY INDIVIDUALS IN NEED OF SUPERVISION, SUPPORT AND/OR INDEPENDENT LIVING TRAINING. DOES NOT INCLUDE: HALFWAY HOUSE, CRISIS RESIDENTIAL CENTER, OR SECURE COMMUNITY TRANSITION FACILITY. MAY INCLUDE: SPECIALIZED GROUP HOME FOR THE DEVELOPMENTALLY DISABLED, GROUP CARE FACILITY FOR CHILDREN, AND BOARDING HOME.

**Paragraph 4 Community Treatment Facility:**

ANY DWELLING OR PLACE LICENSED, CERTIFIED, OR AUTHORIZED BY STATE, FEDERAL, OR LOCAL AUTHORITIES AS A RESIDENCE AND TREATMENT FACILITY FOR **EXAMPLE BUT NOT LIMITED TO** CHILDREN OR ADULTS WITH MENTAL DISABILITIES, ALCOHOLISM, OR DRUG ABUSE PROBLEMS NEEDING A SUPERVISED LIVING ARRANGEMENT AND REHABILITATION SERVICES ON A SHORT-TERM OR LONG-TERM BASIS. DOES NOT INCLUDE DETOXIFICATION CENTERS, HALFWAY HOUSE, CRISIS RESIDENTIAL CENTER OR SECURE COMMUNITY TRANSITION FACILITY. MAY INCLUDE ALCOHOL AND/OR DRUG ABUSE TREATMENT FACILITIES AND ADULT TREATMENT FACILITIES.

**Paragraph 5 HALFWAY HOUSE ANY DWELLING OR PLACE LICENSED, CERTIFIED OR AUTHORIZED BY STATE, FEDERAL, OR LOCAL AUTHORITIES **FOR EXAMPLE BUT NOT LIMITED TO** INMATES ON RELEASE FROM MORE RESTRICTIVE CUSTODIAL CONFINEMENT OR INITIALLY PLACED IN LIEU OF SUCH MORE RESTRICTIVE**

CUSTODIAL CONFINEMENT, WHEREIN SUPERVISION, REHABILITATION, AND COUNSELING ARE PROVIDED TO TRANSITION RESIDENTS BACK INTO SOCIETY, ENABLING THEM TO LIVE INDEPENDENTLY

**Paragraph 7;** Removing definition Passenger Terminal and replacing it with TRANSPORTATION TERMINAL. - A FACILITY FOR LOADING, UNLOADING, AND INTERCHANGE OF PASSENGERS, BAGGAGE, AND INCIDENTAL FREIGHT OR PACKAGE EXPRESS BETWEEN MODES OF GROUND TRANSPORTATION, INCLUDING BUS TERMINALS, RAILROAD STATIONS, AND PUBLIC TRANSIT FACILITIES.

**Paragraph 9;** Add Pawn Shop definition to read: PAWN SHOP. - A USE ENGAGED IN THE LOANING OF MONEY ON THE SECURITY OF PROPERTY PLEDGED IN THE KEEPING OF THE PAWNBROKER AND THE INCIDENTAL SALE OF SUCH PROPERTY.

**Paragraph 11:** BANQUET HALL. - "BANQUET HALL" MEANS ANY PLACE OF BUSINESS MAINTAINED, IN WHOLE OR IN PART, FOR PUBLIC RENTAL FOR THE PURPOSE OF PRIVATE PARTY EVENTS, WHETHER FAMILY, GROUP, OR CORPORATE IN NATURE, WHERE ACCESS BY THE GENERAL PUBLIC IS RESTRICTED, AND WITH OR WITHOUT THE SALE, SERVING OR CONSUMPTION OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES. ADDITIONALLY, IT MAY HAVE A DANCE FLOOR GREATER THAN TWO HUNDRED (200) SQUARE FEET.

**PARAGRAPH 12:** CATERING SERVICE. - AN ESTABLISHMENT THAT PREPARES SERVES, AND SUPPLIES FOOD IN LARGE QUANTITIES TO BE DELIVERED AND CONSUMED OFF PREMISES. DELIVERIES OF FOOD PRODUCTS OCCUR ON A REGULAR BASIS.

**Paragraph 13** COMMUNITY FACILITY. - A BUILDING AVAILABLE TO THE PUBLIC FOR COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES, MEETINGS, BANQUETS, PROJECTS, GATHERINGS, AND THE LIKE. A COMMUNITY CENTER MAY BE ABLE TO BE RESERVED BY THE PUBLIC FOR PRIVATE PARTIES AND EVENTS.

**PARAGRAPH 14:** REPLACE DEFINITION OF FINANCIAL INSTITUTION AND REPLACE IT WITH FINANCIAL INSTITUTION - ANY TRUST COMPANY, SAVINGS BANK, INDUSTRIAL BANK, SAVINGS AND LOAN ASSOCIATION, BUILDING AND LOAN ASSOCIATION, COMMERCIAL BANK, CREDIT UNION, FEDERAL ASSOCIATION, INVESTMENT COMPANY, OR OTHER BUSINESS ASSOCIATION, WHICH IS CHARTERED UNDER FEDERAL OR STATE LAW, SOLICITS, RECEIVES, OR ACCEPTS MONEY OR ITS EQUIVALENT ON DEPOSIT AND LOANS MONEY AS A REGULAR BUSINESS.

**PARAGRAPH 15:** REPLACE DEFINITION TO STATE LABORATORY. -AN ESTABLISHMENT WHOSE PRINCIPAL PURPOSE IS THE RESEARCH, COMPOUNDING AND/OR PACKAGING OF SCIENTIFIC PRODUCTS, WHICH MAY INCLUDE LIGHT MANUFACTURING.

**PARAGRAPH 16:** MUSEUMS: MUSEUM. - "MUSEUM" MEANS A BUILDING, PLACE, OR INSTITUTION DEVOTED TO THE ACQUISITION, CONSERVATION, STUDY, EXHIBITION, AND EDUCATIONAL INTERPRETATION OF OBJECTS HAVING SCIENTIFIC, CULTURAL, HISTORICAL, OR ARTISTIC VALUE.

**PARAGRAPH 17:** NATIONAL REGISTER OF HISTORIC PLACES. - THE OFFICIAL LIST, MAINTAINED BY THE NATIONAL PARK SERVICE OF THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR, OF HISTORIC RESOURCES CONSIDERED BY THAT AGENCY TO BE WORTHY OF PRESERVATION.

**PARAGRAPH 18:** RECEPTION OR MEETING HALL. - ALSO KNOWN AS A RENTAL HALL OR A BANQUET HALL, A BUILDING, FACILITY, ROOM, OR PORTION THEREOF, WHICH IS RENTED, LEASED OR OTHERWISE MADE AVAILABLE TO ANY PERSON OR GROUP FOR A PRIVATE EVENT OR FUNCTION, THAT IS NOT OPEN TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC, WHETHER OR NOT A FEE IS CHARGED.

**PARAGRAPH 19:** SPECIALTY SHOP. - A SMALL-SCALE (LESS THAN 2,500 SQUARE FOOT) RETAIL USE WHICH OFFERS FOR SALE ITEMS OF ART OR CRAFTS, OR WHICH OFFERS FOR SALE ITEMS RELATED TO A SPECIFIC THEME, E.G., KITCHEN WARES, PET CARE, ETC.

**PARAGRAPH 20:** STUDIO, FINE ARTS. - A BUILDING, OR PORTION THEREOF, USED AS A PLACE OF WORK BY A SCULPTOR, ARTIST, OR PHOTOGRAPHER; OR USED AS A PLACE TO EXHIBIT AND OFFER FOR SALE WORKS OF THE VISUAL ARTS (OTHER THAN FILM).

**SECTION B, 2. PARKING FACILITY-** STRIKE OUT CURRENT DEFINITION OF PARKING FACILITY AND REPLACE WITH PARKING FACILITY: A STRUCTURE OR PART OF A BUILDING IN WHICH (A) PARKING SPACE IS PROVIDED, EXCEPT FOR COMMERCIAL OR PUBLIC UTILITY VEHICLES OR DEAD STORAGE; AND (B) SOME OR ALL OF THE PARKING SPACES ARE NON- ACCESSORY. A PUBLIC PARKING FACILITY MAY INCLUDE ACCESSORY OFF-STREET PARKING SPACES LIMITED TO SUCH SPACES WHICH ARE ACCESSORY TO OTHER USES ON THE SAME ZONING LOT.

**SECTION B, 3: PARKING LOT:** A TRACT OF LAND WHICH: IS USED FOR PARKING EXCEPT FRO COMMERCIAL OR PUBLIC UTILITY VEHICLES OR DEAD STORAGE; AND (B) IS NOT ACCESSORY TO A USE ON THE SAME OR ANOTHER ZONING LOT.

**SECTION B, 5 RETAIL SALES:** STRIKE THE CURRENT DEFINITION AND REPLACE WITH THE FOLLOWING: RETAIL SALES AND SERVICES - AN ESTABLISHMENT PRIMARILY ENGAGED IN THE RETAIL SALE OF GOODS, SERVICES AND/OR PRODUCTS (INCLUDING BAKED PRODUCTS, ICE CREAM, AND/OR CANDY FOR CONSUMPTION OFF SITE WITH NO SEATING PROVIDED ON SITE). SUCH USES MAY INCLUDE INCIDENTAL FOOD SERVICE.

**SECTION B, 6 VISITORS CENTER, VISITORS INFORMATION CENTER OR TOURIST INFORMATION CENTER- A PHYSICAL LOCATION THAT PROVIDED TOURIST INFORMATION TO THE VISITS WHO TOUR THE PLACE OR AREA LOCALLY.**

AFTER DISCUSSION REGARDING ORDINANCE 913

A MOTION WAS MADE BY COUNCILMEMBER MILLER AND SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER SHANK TO STRIKE PROPOSED AMENDMENT ITEM 13 COMMUNITY FACILITY DEFINITIONS.

A MOTION WAS MADE BY COUNCILMEMBER MILLER AND SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER SHANK TO STRIKE THE PROPOSED DEFINITION OF FINANCIAL INSTITUTION AND HOLD EXISTING DEFINITION CODE

A MOTION WAS MADE BY COUNCILMEMBER MILLER AND SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER SHANK TO STRIKE THE PROPOSED TEXT IN PARENTHESIS IN THE RETAIL SALE DEFINITION. THE DEFINITION WILL NOW STATE RETAIL SALES AND SERVICES -AN ESTABLISHMENT PRIMARILY ENGAGED IN THE RETAIL SALE OF GOODS, SERVICES AND/OR PRODUCTS SUCH USES MAY INCLUDE INCIDENTAL FOOD SERVICE.

A MOTION WAS MADE BY COUNCILMEMBER MILLER AND SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER SHANK TO STRIKE THE TEXT "GROUND" IN PARAGRAPH 7 TRANSPORTATION TERMINAL.

A MOTION WAS MADE BY COUNCILMEMBER CULLUM TO KEEP THE CURRENT DEFINITION OF VISITORS CENTER, SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER MILLER.

AMENDMENTS WERE PASSED 6-0 ON ROLL CALL VOTE.

ORDINANCE 913 AS AMENDED WAS PASSED ON ROLL CALL VOTE 6-0.

**ORDINANCE NO 914 AN ORDINANCE BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF HAVRE DE GRACE ADOPTED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF ARTICLE XI-E OF THE MARYLAND CONSTITUTION, ARTICLE 23A AND 66B OF THE ANNOTATED CODE OF MARYLAND, AND SECTIONS 33 AND 34 OF THE HAVRE DE GRACE CITY CHARTER, FOR THE PURPOSE OF AMENDING HAVRE DE GRACE CITY CODE CHAPTER 205 ZONING ARTICLE VII RB RESIDENTIAL BUSINESS DISTRICT SECTIONS 205-26, PRINCIPAL PERMITTED USES AND SECTION 205-27 CONDITIONAL USES.**

A motion was made by Councilmember Guldenzopf and seconded by Councilmember Miller to introduce Ordinance 914 on second reading. Motion carries 6-0. A motion was made by Councilmember Shank and seconded by Councilmember Miller to adopt Ordinance 914. Under the question a motion was made by Councilmember Miller to amend Ordinance 914, Councilmember Cullum seconded motion. Motion carries 6-0 on amendments. The approved amendments were grammatical and syntax changes to the Ordinance.

Council President Craig and seconded by Councilmember Miller to amend Section L and Section Y, which both currently states only financial institutions, by adding "banks" and financial institutions.

Upon a roll call of six affirmative votes, the amendments were approved.

Further, a motion was made by Councilmember Miller seconded by Council President Craig, to remove Sections "AA", "CC", and "DD" from Conditional Uses in the RB District. A motion was made by Councilmember Martin and seconded by Councilmember Cullum to remove only Sections "AA", "CC", and "DD" from the RB Conditional Uses. Upon a roll call of six votes, the amendment was approved.

On motion by Councilmember Guldenzopf and seconded by Council President Craig, "Item O", Parking Facility, Lot, was changed from a Permitted Use to a Conditional Use. Upon a roll call of six affirmative votes, the amendment was approved.

Upon a roll call of six affirmative votes, the Ordinance 914, as amended, was adopted on second reading.

A motion was made by Council President Craig and seconded by Councilmember Guldenzopf to adopt Ordinance 915. Upon a roll call of 4 in favor and Councilmember's Martin and Miller opposing the motion, Ordinance 915 was approved 4-2.
