

2016 Atlantic Hurricane Season


The **2016 Atlantic hurricane season** officially began on June 1, 2016, and will end on November 30, 2016. However, as illustrated by Hurricane Alex and Tropical Storm Bonnie, the formation of tropical cyclones is possible at any time of the year. This season started exceptionally early, nearly five months before the official start, with Hurricane Alex forming in the Northeastern Atlantic in mid-January. Tropical Storm Bonnie followed in late May, which was the first occurrence of two pre-season Atlantic storms since 2012.

To this point, most forecasting groups have expected this season to be an above average season, due to a combination of factors including an expected transition to **La Niña** and warmer than normal sea surface temperatures in the Gulf of Mexico, Caribbean, and Western Atlantic, despite near-average sea surface temperatures in the Atlantic Main Development Region near **Cape Verde**. So far, all five of the season's storms have impacted land and caused loss of life, directly or indirectly.


